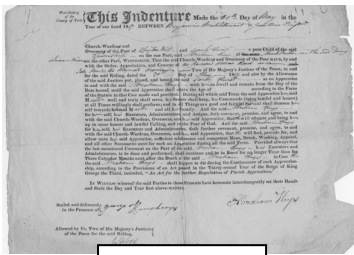


Sarah Hurst – Source 2

Sarah Hurst was a poor child from Clayton West, from 30 May 1817, she was put into the care of Abraham Hays, a linen weaver from Monk Bretton, until she was 21.



Source A

Transcription of source: “the said apprentice her said Master well and truly shall serve, his secrets shall keep, his commands (being lawful and honest) at all times willingly shall perform; and in all things as a good and faithful servant, shall demean herself towards her said Master and all his family.”

30 May 1817, Clayton West, Deighton, Thornhill and Thurstonland, apprenticeship indentures, KC340/3/001, Kirklees (GB 204).

The Official Secrets Act 1989 came into force on 1 March 1990. The 1989 Act replaces section 2 of the Official Secrets Act 1911, under which it was a criminal offence to disclose any official information without lawful authority.

1. Who is affected by the Act?

The Act applies to



- **Crown servants**, including
 - government ministers
 - civil servants, including members of the diplomatic service
 - members of the armed forces
 - the police
